As a school, we appreciate your support and look forward to working with you to ensure best outcomes for your child this year and throughout their time in Fairview.


Strike Action by Various Unions on Thursday 18th January

Open Enrolment Process - P1 September 2024

The admissions process for children starting school in September 2024 opened on Tuesday 9th January at 12noon. If you have a child with a birthday between 2nd July 2019 and 1st July 2020, or if you deferred their admission to primary school in September 2023, then it is important that you register your child before 12noon on Friday 26th January.

Attendance and Uniform

Attending school regularly is important for all children because of the link between attendance and attainment. Regular attendance at school combined with high quality teaching and learning ensures that pupils get the best possible outcomes from their time in Fairview, and also avail of the most opportunities presented to them, academic and extra-curricular.

There has been a lot of sickness this winter, leading to many school absences. If your child is ill, they should not be in school. But as far as possible, please endeavour to have your child in school ready to start at 8.55am, with doors open from 8.45am. When your child is late, it disrupts their start to the day and very often it disrupts the whole class. Homes can be busy places in the morning but please make every effort to have your child in school on time.

I had the pleasure of visiting P6 Mrs McIvor this week to present them with their attendance trophy for December, achieving an incredible 95% attendance. Well done to P1 Miss Dickson on winning the Junior School trophy with 93.3%. The Senior School trophy went to P7 Mrs Norris achieving 94.9% attendance.





We pride ourselves on our uniform in Fairview. At the start of a new term, it is worth a reminder so standards remain high. On PE days, P4-P7 should wear their PE kit which consists of navy tracksuit bottoms or navy leggings for girls, the Fairview T shirt and hoodie (both available from Sport 'n' Sound). All other days should be normal school uniform with black shoes. A change should be brought if required for P5-P7 who are doing after school activities on a non PE day. Pupils **should not** have earrings in when at school and we would really appreciate your support with this.



Online Safety Newsletter January 2024

WhatsApp

You must be at least 16 years old to register for and use WhatsApp.

WhatsApp is a free messaging app that allows you to send messages, voice notes, photos and videos.

What should I be aware of?

Group chats: One of the key features is the group chat function. Everybody in the group, even if they are not one of your child's phone contacts, will be able to see all messages within that group. If your child is added to a group with someone that they have previously blocked, that person can still see their messages and send them messages within the group chat. In settings, you can change who can add your child to groups. You can leave a group chat at any point so talk to your child and encourage them to leave any chat that makes them feel uncomfortable.

Location sharing: you can share your location on WhatsApp. Talk to your child about when this would be appropriate to use but also the potential danger of sharing their location, for example with strangers.

Blocking/Reporting: Show your child how to block and report other users or inappropriate content. You can find out how to do it based on your child's device here:

LEGO Fortnite – PEGI 7

Lego Fortnite is free to play (in game purchases are available though). The game has been rated as PEGI 7, meaning that the content is suitable for children over the age of 7. However, you should be aware that this game can be played with up to seven people (or solo). Lego Fortnite is only accessible on Fortnite, so you must download the main game. When setting up an account, if your child is under the age of 13, then they will be given a 'cabined account,' therefore certain features will be disabled (such as communicating with other players) unless you override them.

Please ensure you set the parental controls as appropriate for your child, we also recommend setting the appropriate settings on the console itself.


YouTube

YouTube is intended for users over the age of 13 (however, children of all ages may use the Service and YouTube Kids if enabled by a parent/legal guardian).

What if my child is under the age of 13?

If your child is under the age of 13 then your child should use either YouTube Kids or a Supervised Account. Which option you choose, will depend on your child's age and your requirements.

- **YouTube Kids** this is a separate app that includes a smaller selection of videos based on the age you select:
 - Preschool (ages four and under)
 - Younger (ages 5–8)
 - Older (ages 9–12)



- **Explore** Generally for viewers aged 9+.
- Explore more Generally for viewers aged 13+
- Most of YouTube This setting includes almost everything on YouTube except for videos marked as 18+ and other videos that may not be appropriate for viewers using supervised experiences.

Posting videos

You should be over 13 to post videos. If your child does post videos on YouTube, ensure they understand what information they should keep private and what to do if they receive negative comments. Talk to them about the different settings available -

- 1. Public: anyone can view the video.
- 2. Private: video can only be viewed by users that you select.
- 3. Unlisted: only people who have the link to the video can view it.

How can I make YouTube safer?

- Explore YouTube together and see what they like to watch. Make sure your child understands that they can **talk to you** if they see anything that makes them feel uncomfortable online.
- **Restricted mode** is an additional setting (when logged in via a Google account) to restrict the availability of mature content.

Dear Parent/Carer,

I am writing to you about forthcoming strike action by the five teaching unions in Northern Ireland.

You may have seen coverage of this in the news, and I wanted to inform you about the impact this is likely to have at our school, if as expected, the strike action goes ahead.

How will strike action affect Fairview Primary School?

When a strike takes place, those taking strike action stop work and withdraw their labour. Staff members involved in this industrial action will therefore not undertake any duties on 18th January 2024. A detailed risk assessment has been conducted which considers the impact the action will have on the health and safety of pupils, staff and visitors, and whether the school can run a full or amended curriculum, to determine whether it is possible to operate the school safely during the strike. The Board of Governors has determined that on **Thursday 18th January 2024** we will be **closed for all pupils** and all **will reopen** as normal on **Friday 19th January 2024**.

Why are staff striking?

- Education in Northern Ireland has been systematically defunded in recent years, resulting in decimating reductions in support, resource and capacity.
- The teaching profession has filled in the growing gaps, holding the fragmenting system together and protecting children from the impact of the cuts.
- Pay paralysis, when set alongside the working conditions of the teaching profession in Northern Ireland, is having a devastating impact on the profession, with clear evidence that we will not be able to recruit or retain teachers and school leaders in the future if these issues are not resolved. Education is in crisis.
- Taking strike action is the last resort. This could have been avoided and, indeed, can still be avoided.
- The responsibility to resolve this dispute lies squarely with the employing authorities and the Department of Education.

Clearly this is a difficult situation, which will cause some disruption. I would ask you, however, to be understanding. This is a very unusual circumstance and is the direct result of the failure to take into account the very real concerns expressed by teachers and school leaders. Taking strike action is not something that anyone would undertake lightly. Those on strike will have thought long and hard about their decision and will also lose pay for the period that they are on strike.
