Football Team at Northern Ireland Match

Some of our Primary 7 football squad members got the opportunity to play at half time during the Northern Ireland versus England Under 18 Centenary Shield match last Friday night at The Blanchflower Stadium in East Belfast. This was a wonderful opportunity for the boys involved and such a lovely memory to take with them from their final year in primary school.



Our squad played against Andrews Memorial and earned a well-deserved 1-0 win, although the score line was less important than the overall experience. A wonderful night was had by all, with a special thank you to Mr Kennedy for organising.



Antrim and District Primary Schools Football Tournament

On Wednesday, Mr Kennedy accompanied two football teams to Allen Park in Antrim for the third of the Antrim and District Schools Football Tournaments. The first game for the senior team was against Antrim PS who beat us narrowly last time out. Fairview started brightly and almost opened the scoring early through Tyler McCreery. Tyler beat his man on the wing and drove his subsequent shot just wide of the far post. Bobbie McCullough saw his shot go narrowly wide soon after while the Antrim goalkeeper made an excellent reaction save with his legs following a deflection from another Tyler McCreery shot. Antrim pushed for a goal of their own but Jay Crawford and Angus Hassard were resolute in defence. Rueben Lambe, playing in goals for the injured Amelia, made a couple of good saves of his own to thwart the Antrim attack. Teddy McGrath was finding more space on the left and after receiving a pass from Angus, his scooped shot beat the keeper but went narrowly over the bar. Aiden Mouatakef received a through ball from Teddy but saw his shot well saved as it looked destined for the top corner. With full time approaching, Fairview were awarded a free kick following a trip on Bobbie. The kick was taken by Tyler but he was unlucky to see his shot rebound off the post with the keeper beaten. Full time: Fairview 0 : 0 Antrim

Our next match was against Ballyclare PS. Again, Fairview started strongly and dominated the early possession. Bobbie and Tyler both saw early shots go narrowly wide while Aiden and Teddy both had shots saved by the Ballyclare goalkeeper. Ballyclare had an early chance too as their player found themselves unmarked at the back post following an attack up the left wing. However, the shot was comfortably saved by Rueben in goals. After a series of corners the deadlock was finally broken. As the ball was cleared it fell to Bobbie in midfield who played a neat 'one two' with Tyler before placing the ball into the top corner of the goal to make it 1-0. The goal tally was doubled just a minute later. This time it was Bobbie to played Tyler through with just the keeper to beat and he slotted past the keeper into the side of the goal. With just a few minutes left, Angus Hassard received the pass from Jay on his right and made it 3-0 with delightful half-volley into the roof of the net. Full time: Fairview 3 : 0 Ballyclare



Our final match was against St. Comgall's PS who started on the front foot. Tenacious and energetic, it was clear it would be another tough game for the Fairview boys. St. Comgall's had the first real chance of the game but Jay did well to intercept just as the striker was about to shoot. Rueben Lambe made a great save with his feet a minute later from a St. Comgall's corner and we were thankful to see the resulting shot go narrowly over the bar. It was Fairview who scored the opening goal however. Receiving a pass from Bobbie, Aiden Mouatekef side-stepped his marker and poked the ball into the bottom of the net to make it 1-0. Jay Crawford made it 2-0 moments later when his strong shot deflected off the keepers glove and crossed the line. Despite the best efforts of St. Comgall's, the Fairview defence of Angus Hassard and Jay Crawford weren't going to be beaten. Fairview made it 3-0 through Teddy McGrath. His high, looping shot was parried into his own net by the keeper before Jay finished off a super performance, scoring his second of the match and making the final score 4 nil. In the closing minutes, St. Comgall's were awarded a penalty after a trip on the attacking player. However, Rueben was up to the challenge and made a great save, low to his right. Full time: Fairview 4 : 0 St. Comgall's

With one school not able to make the tournament, it meant the opportunity to bring a second team, giving more of our pupils the chance to play in a competitive tournament. The first game for the Fairview 'B' team was against Ballyclare PS. Ballyclare opened the scoring early, catching the Fairview boys cold. However, the Fairview boys rallied and played some neat passing, creating opportunities for Tom Livingston and Lucas Grimley who both saw their shots saved. Ballyclare doubled their lead soon after, the striker slotting the ball beneath the dive of Marc Agnew in nets to make it 2-0. Fairview pulled one back through Lucas Grimley. He ran on to a through ball from Tom in midfield before poking the ball past the keeper to make it 2-1. Ballyclare pushed hard and scored their third despite the despairing lunge of Connor Hanley in defence. Theo McDowell had a header go narrowly wide following a corner while Corey Crosbie saw his first time shot sail over the bar. With Fairview pushing for a goal, Ballyclare hit on the counter attack, running between the defensive pairing of Connor Hanley and Tommy Darragh and slotting home to make it 4-0. Final score: Fairview 1 : 4 Ballyclare Next up for the boys was St. Comgall's PS and this time it was Fairview who scored first. Corey Crosbie received the ball on the left and passed to Tom in midfield. He played a through ball for Lucas who struck the ball firmly

past the outstretched hands of the keeper. A few minutes later St. Comgall's equalised. Running from midfield, the St. Comgall's player sidestepped the defender and slotted past Marc's outstretched arm to make it 1-1. Fairview's next goal was almost a carbon copy of the first. Again, Tom Livingston played a super through ball behind the defence for Lucas Grimley to run through and score, making it 2-1. It was 3-1 soon after following an unfortunate OG. From a Theo McDowell corner, the St. Comgall's defender headed the ball past his own keeper. St. Comgall's pulled a goal back despite an excellent tackle from Tommy Darragh in the build up followed by a super, one handed save by Marc in nets. The ball broke to a St. Comgall's player who made no mistake from 5 yards out, making it 3-2. Fairview then scored two more goals in quick succession. Firstly, Tom intercepted a pass out from the St. Comgall's keeper and slotted the ball home to make it 4-2 before Lucas completed his hat-trick. Receiving the ball from Corey, Lucas spun and hit a fiercely struck shot off the underside of the crossbar and in. In the final seconds, St. Comgall's scored a consolation goal to make it 5-3. Final score: Fairview 5 : 3 St. Comgall's

The third and final match for the 'B' team was against Creggan PS. Buoyed by the previous win, the boys started well. Corey played a super pass to Tom who was unlucky to see his shot go wide. Theo McDowell had a shot well saved by the Creggan keeper while Lucas' header went just over the bar following Theo's corner. At the other end, Connor and Tommy were kept busy and made a number of timely tackles, ably assisted by Marc Agnew who made a number of saves and interceptions. However, the defence was finally beaten when the Creggan player found himself unmarked and was able to place the ball into the bottom corner to make it 1-0. Fairview continued to have chances to equalise. The best of these fell to Theo who ran clear of the Creggan defence but unselfishly chose to pass rather than shoot; the ball eventually cleared from danger. Creggan doubled their lead near the end, heading in from a corner on the right. Final score: Fairview 0 : 2 Creggan

A huge 'well done' to all 14 boys who played brilliantly all day, showing great determination and sportsmanship throughout.

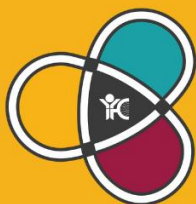

Managing Screen time from Internet Matters

Are you worried your child has too much screentime or would like more advice on how to support your child in managing their screen time? Internet Matters have a wealth of information on their website to help support you.

Fortnite Battle Royale

Fortnite Battle Royale is rated PEGI 12 because it features moderate violence which means it is not suitable for persons under 12 years of age.

It is important to remember that when rating games, PEGI do not take into consideration the communication features of a game. Fortnite does include a chat facility, which adds further risks.



What is Fortnite?

There are different versions of Fortnite, including Battle Royale, which is free to play (although in-app purchases are available). In Battle Royale up to one hundred players compete against each other.

What do I need to be aware of?

- **Chatting to strangers and inappropriate language:** Fortnite contains voice and text chat. Due to the nature of the game, your child may be chatting to strangers and may hear inappropriate language. Ensure your child knows how to report players for any inappropriate behaviour.
- **In app purchases:** All users can purchase V-Bucks directly through the game so make sure you don't store your card details within the game/device and restrict purchases.

Parental Controls

Fortnite includes several parental controls to help you make it a safer environment for your child including disabling voice chat, filtering language and setting privacy settings. **Also, remember to set up age-appropriate parental controls on the device your child is playing on.**

Instagram

You will probably know that Instagram is used to post photos and videos, but did you know that it can also be used to message, voice/video call and send disappearing messages? Users can also upload to 'Stories' (which disappear after 24 hours), broadcast live and upload reels (short videos).

You must be over 13 years of age to set up an account. To create an account, you must enter a date of birth (but it is not verified). *When you set up an account for users under 16 years old, the account is set to Private. This is the recommended setting so that your child approves who follows them and sees their content.* Even if your child's profile is private, their bio (at the top of their profile) can still be seen by **everyone**. Check they have not included personal information here e.g. they should not be wearing their school uniform in their photo.

Instagram includes several privacy settings, so go through these with your child and ensure they are set appropriately. Settings include:

- Messages/Group chats – set who can message you/add you to groups.
- Story replies – you can turn this off or choose who can message you.
- Hidden words – turn this option on to hide comments/messages that may be offensive. You can also add your own custom words or emojis.

Make sure your child understands that there is a risk that content they upload can be shared with others without their permission as other users can screenshot it.

Supervision

You can set up supervision on your child's (aged 13-17) Instagram account. This gives you access to a set of tools including the ability to see who they follow/who follows them, how much time they are spending on Instagram, set a time limit and view accounts your child has blocked. Safety Features

Quiet mode

Your child can activate quiet mode, so they do not receive notifications (to provide less distraction whilst studying and at night time).

Do you need help managing your child's device?

You can use Google Family Link or Apple Family Sharing to help you depending on your child's device.

Google Family Link

This is a parental control app from Google that lets you:

- See activity reports showing how long they spend on each app.
- Approve or block new app downloads.
- Set screen time limits.
- Find their location (using their device).

You will need to download an app and then decide appropriate settings.

Apple Family Sharing

You can set up Family Sharing in the settings of your device. Family Sharing allows you to:

- Share Apple subscriptions.
- Share purchases from the App Store.
- Approve what children purchase/download.
- Limit screen time.
- Share locations and find devices.
